Tamsyn d'Arienzo Report HPC January 2023

Christmas

One of my favourite times in Hamsey Parish, and plenty to be proud of here.

- 1. Parties. A huge effort to great effect from the HPC Team to put on 2 events on one night- a light trail for the children and an evening party for the adults complete with photobooth, dj, and complimentary pizzas for our amazing volunteers and contractors. Both events were a great success, with very happy Christmassy memories made. Particular thanks to the Kinch family and Cllr Henry for helping with cleaning for much of the next day.
- 2. Trees of Light. Howard Eaton has done us proud again, lighting up the faces of every passing person, driver or train passenger with his show stopping illuminations. Thanks a million to Howard's team, and to a resident for supplying the electricity.
- 3. Sleigh. Hamsey Christmas Sleigh continues to be a labour of love for myself and the team who invest a significant amount of time and energy into caring for this brilliant vehicle. This year Santa and his elves (plus one Grinch!) lit up little faces all around the parish, as well as special guests at Greenacres at South Chailey, and some at East Chiltington. I further liaised with Chailey Tractor Club and Barcombe Parish Council to hand the sleigh over to them for their own community and fundraising events which were a great success.
- 4. Kids Meetup with Mini run by Cllr Carrie Henry is a big hit. It's amazing and selfless of Cllr Henry to manage these meet ups whilst managing her own small ones, and her full time job. We are very lucky to have Carrie running this for our smallest residents and their grateful parents.

Website down

Unfortunately community website hamsey.net website along with 30 other parishes, and Friends of Hamsey Church website, is down without any hope for recovery. Myself and Cllr Minty Cadwallader are working to get a new one set up ASAP.

Housing

Anyone who has missed the news of potential housing plans for Cooksbridge probably won't be reading these minutes either, however it should be noted that

https://www.donturbanisehamsey.org/ is a good resource for information about these plans. Previously we have directed people to hamsey.net/planning, but at the time of writing, this website has been declared irretrievably damaged by a virus (one of 30 parish councils), so we are working on getting a replacement up and running ASAP.

The scale of the proposals, for up to 1100 homes which would effectively join up Cooksbridge with Hamsey village, decimating the fields along the way, is truly shocking. Please keep an eye out on Hamsey Community Facebook, as well as the above campaign, and hamsey.net when it's back up and running - all places with ideas for ways in which you can have your voice heard when responding to the latest consultation http://www.planningpolicyconsult.lewes-eastbourne.gov.uk/ which closes on 8th February.

Planning

I attend Planning Service User Group meetings for insights into Planning changes (national and local) developments and issues/changes at LDC (Lewes District Council). Our parish is quite unusual in that it falls both within LDC and SDNP. A recent SDNPA (South Downs National Park Authority) workshop I attended with Cllr Minty Cadwallader did not give away which sites are being considered for housing, but it did indicate that sites within the Park, which adjoin existing settlements outside the Park may be considered. We expect news in Spring.

Bevernbridge

I can safely say not a month has gone by since 2014 when I have not been involved in Bevernbridge planning applications and developments in some capacity. Much of these communications have been negotiating with developers in relation to planning conditions and community benefits, for example changing plans to allow all Bevernbridge residents access to the woodlands rather than enclosing them with thorns, and having junk removed from the same area in the ancient woodlands there. Most recent communications have been about house builder Antler installing bus shelters (which would not have been installed without Hamsey Parish Council accepting future maintenance of them), road safety (trying to push for a reduced speed limit and safer crossing), and a new community building (set to be provided to local residents once the latest stage of house building is complete). HPC is likely to be key in working with Old Hamsey Lakes and Bevernbridge residents to set up a working group and apply for grants and planning consent to convert the new shell into a community hub once the ownership has changed hands.

Sustrans Active Travel Route

Cycleway charity Sustrans have completed their feasibility study for possible overland walk and cycle routes which avoid the A275 and connect South Chailey via Bevernbridge to Cooksbridge, Offham, Hamsey and Lewes. The report provides a good starting point for talks with key landowners in January/February, who will no doubt have some good suggestions of their own.

Chairmans Forum

Main issues are around housing developments and road safety.

Beechwood Hall

My grant application for CIL (Community infrastructure money) towards a new Changing Places unit at Beechwood Hall was unfortunately unsuccessful in this round. SDNPA has invited us to reapply for the next round, so we will speak to a trusted architect to see if we can adapt plans to make them more attractive to the committee. We are currently seeking engineers to survive the wind turbine for routine maintenance, and we have a big bill to pay to have the zip wire made more stable. I met with glaziers before Christmas as a door at the hall crashed against a bench in the wind, causing the glass to smash. Hall Manager Kelly has been liaising to replace the glass but it's not been easy. Kelly managed to have the floors replaced in the kitchen and bathrooms, so visitors can benefit from a flat and non-slip surface from now on.

Footpaths

Many dog walkers are now walking their dogs around the village on pavements because of the mud created by the recent cultivation of footpaths locally. It has greatly affected the enjoyment of the countryside for many people and I hope the same situation will not be repeated next year.

EVRI

After a long battle (since September 2022), I am pleased to report that my court action against courier company Evri has resulted in a payout to cover the cost of our lost football nets and wheels, as well as court costs. The money, which had been written off, can ow be channelled back into some positive community endeavours, as well as probably more nets and wheels!

Grass Cutting

Despite being given many hoops to jump through, we have decided to move away from ESCC (county council) contracted grass cutting this year, and instead have instructed Barcombe Landscapes as they carry out good work for Beechwood Hall. Hopefully this local touch will result in a higher standard, and more appropriate timings depending on weather etc.

New Councillors

We have had interest from two residents who I believe will make excellent parish councillors. I hope they will be on board over the next two months. Meanwhile we all are conscious of the need for someone to assume Chairperson responsibilities when I step down this May.

School Parking- Station agreement

I approached Network Rail, and ultimately car park owners GTR to explain the impact station car park charging is having on street parking, particularly during drop off and pick up times at Hamsey School. GTR has kindly agreed that parents may use the railway station carpark for short periods at the beginning and end of the school day. Head of School Mr Dean has communicated this option to parents with a reminder not to park outside the school, where visibility is needed for families crossing the road.

Trees

We have had some beautiful trees planted around the parish courtesy of LDC. ESCC have made a few errors in where some have been planted by contractors so I will be meeting them in January to arrange for some relocations.

After many communications I am pleased to say that the overbearing high hedge by Malthouse Way playground is in the process of being reduced to an appropriate size. Work so far has made a huge difference to the condition of the new playground surface, and to sunlight, whilst pressure on the boundary fence has been greatly reduced. I am assured by the resident of the leylandii trees that the final works will be completed as soon as their tree surgeon is restored to good health.

Biodiversity Policy

Background

Biodiversity means the variety of life around us and includes every species of plant and animal, the genetic material that makes them what they are, and the communities that they form. Biodiversity is essential to sustaining the living networks, or 'ecosystems', that provide us all with health, wealth, food, fuel and the vital services our lives depend on. It is a core component of sustainable development, underpinning economic development and prosperity. Conserving biodiversity can include restoring or enhancing a population or habitat.

Section 40 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act (NERC) 2006 makes it clear that as a public authority Hamsey Parish Council has a duty to have regard to conserving biodiversity as part of its policy and decision making.

To help fulfil its commitments outlined in this policy, Hamsey Parish Council commits to carrying out a biodiversity audit when circumstances permit.

Policy

The Council will show that it has regard for conserving biodiversity if it has identified ways to integrate biodiversity when it:

- 1. Uses the extent to which the site and building design of planning applications benefit biodiversity through the conservation and integration of existing habitats or provision of new habitats, as one of the criteria for supporting the applications.
- 2. Endeavours to conserve the biodiversity of the land it manages. It will adopt practices beneficial for biodiversity regarding cutting and removal of vegetation, application of chemicals and timing of maintenance work.
- 3. Takes care to word the specification of ground maintenance contracts to ensure that the work, while reaching acceptable standards, does not harm the natural environment.
- 4. Works in partnership with other organisations to protect, promote and enhance biodiversity within the parish.
- 5. Raises, wherever possible, public awareness of biodiversity issues by means of, for example, community involvement in biodiversity projects in the parish, such as tree planting and maintenance, wildflower meadows, birdbox making.
- 6. Communicates information and raises awareness of biodiversity through its website and newsletters.
